# **Pastor's Page**

Greetings Summer Hill!

The first Sunday of December is also the first Sunday of Advent this year, so you know what that means, right? Yep, Christmas is just right around the corner! Sometimes it seems to come around so fast that I feel like I am just never quite as prepared as I had hoped I would be. But then again, I seem to say that every year.

And that is exactly the reason why we observe the season of Advent on the church calendar. Because in our daily lives we are always just too busy trying to survive and do what we have to do, to simply slow down and get prepared for Christmas on our own. Advent is the purposeful time for us to take a break from the hustle and bustle of this world, and ponder the greatest gift that the world was ever given, God with us....Emmanuel.

During the four weeks of Advent, we are encouraged to pause from our daily work and take some time to focus on the meaning of God incarnate...God in the flesh...in the form of a tiny helpless baby named Jesus. We take time to journey with Mary and Joseph as they journeyed to Bethlehem during what had to be a difficult and tiring weeklong trip, especially with Mary nearing the time to give birth. We take time to consider the magi, who saw a star and read the signs announcing the birth of a King in a land far from their homeland. We take time to imagine the great wonder and fear of the poor shepherds who saw a miraculous angelic announcement of the birth of Christ. We take time to consider what it all must have been like, nearly two thousand years ago, and what it all means to us today.

The important thing is that we take time. Time to realign our thoughts from the temporary earthly priorities that seem to consume us, and turn our thoughts back to God and the real meaning of Christmas. Everyone has too much to do during these next four weeks, including myself. Everyone will feel unprepared because of something that they had to leave undone, or simply did not even have the time to begin. That is just the way it goes during this time. But, everyone also has the time to stop, and give a few minutes a day or even just an hour a week of our attention back to the one who came to live among us, and then gave their life for us, so that we may believe and have life eternal.

That is why we observe Advent. So that we are prepared to once again welcome Jesus back into our lives, and to turn back to God and begin to travel the path to which each of us is called. It is not always easy to do. Nor was the path Mary traveled to Bethlehem on a donkey while nine months pregnant, and nor was the path that Jesus traveled to the cross. But each path was a step towards the greatest gift we could ever hope for, and the greatest gift the world has ever received. And all we need to do now, is to accept the true meaning of Christmas and allow a little baby to rock our world once more.

Come join us this Advent Season at St. Paul's, as we travel together during the next four weeks to the place where we will greet our Savior with open arms and sing songs of praise, just as the angels sang on that first Holy Night. Take the time to experience the true meaning of Christmas and welcome Christ into this world and into our lives.

### **A Year End Letter from the Stewardship Ministry Team**

Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's Summer Hill United Church of Christ:

As we approach the end of the year, we are able to get a clearer picture of how our faith community has responded to the financial needs required to keep the ministries of St. Paul's vibrant and sustainable. And as with all things, there is good news, and news that will challenge all of us to prayerfully consider how we can do better.

Closing out 2023, giving to the church has increased over 2022 by about \$9,000 year-on-year, however, we are still behind approximately \$25,000 in meeting our budgetary goals. When we do not receive sufficient contributions to pay all the bills at the end of the year, we must take funds out of our limited savings accounts to cover the shortfall. Unfortunately, this has been the trend for the past few years, which has certainly been exacerbated by the pandemic and now by the inflationary pressures we all have been experiencing. However, using our limited savings is only a short-term solution, since at some point we will not have enough in savings to make up the budget deficit.

If giving continues to fall short of budget, we will need to consider alternative cost saving measures to reduce the overall budget to meet the funds available for ministry, but we have reason to be hopeful that St. Paul's will not be put into that position as so many other churches currently find themselves in. We are blessed to have many faithful givers who week after week respond to God's call to return just a small portion of that which God has provided to us. But those givers only represent approximately 34% of our total membership which means 66% of those who call St. Paul's their church, have not made a significant contribution towards its ministries this year.

If each of those members were able to give as little as \$10/week, we would be able to make up our budget deficit, so even the smallest weekly gift does matter. We need everyone's support, so we can be there to support you and the community. Please prayerfully consider how you will be able to help us spread the Good News of Jesus Christ love for all and keep St. Paul's a shining light upon Summer Hill.

#### **Christian Symbol**



**ROSE** — This flower, often shown as stylized artwork, is a symbol for Advent, the promise of the Messiah and Jesus' nativity. A white rose represents the Virgin Mary, and a red rose stands for martyrs. A wreath of roses symbolizes heavenly joy.

### **Advent meanings**

During Advent, which begins this year on December 3, many churches and families use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope or creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility or penitence).

The four candles that each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

The round, green Advent wreath has special meaning of its own. It symbolizes eternal life and the unending love of God, who sent his only Son to earth to die in our place.

# **Holiday Humor**

Much planning and preparation goes into worship during December. But that doesn't mean Christmas services and pageants are always picture-perfect. For anyone who's experienced holiday chaos (who hasn't?!), take comfort in knowing you're not alone.


Church leaders who shared stories with Outreach magazine describe an alarming number of Christmas candle vs. hair incidents. Here's what else has transpired:
