Pastor's Page

Lenten Greetings Summer Hill!

I am always caught off guard by how fast the next church season comes around on the liturgical calendar. After what is always an extremely busy Advent and Christmas season at the end of the regular calendar year, I look forward to those few weeks of 'ordinary' time before heading into the busiest season for the church, Lent and Easter. But this year it seems like Lent will begin way too early. I still catch myself singing "Away in the Manger", while I should be thinking about "The Old Rugged Cross".

It could be worse though. The earliest Lent can begin is on February 4th. But that does not happen very often. The last time it did was in 1818, and it won't happen again until the year 2285! This year, Lent begins on February 14th, which is Ash Wednesday as well as Valentines Day. For the next 46 days, we will journey together through a time of self-examination and repentance as we are also increasingly filled with hope and expectancy anticipating Easter morning. It is actually quite a juxtaposition to place ourselves in.

In the ancient church, when normal everyday life was extremely hard and resources were scarce, it did not take a lot of imagination to feel as though they were walking with Jesus during his forty days in the wilderness. Self-denial was more of a common occurrence, as parents gave up their food to feed their children, or people would forgo other earthly necessities to ensure their loved ones were warm and taken care of. But today, in our increasingly self-centered and instant gratification society, it is very difficult to deny ourselves the pleasures we have come to expect and desire.

For most people today, taking the time to attend Lenten church services is a burden, and we simply do not have time to participate in an extended Bible study. Looking for things that we are willing to

deny ourselves, like our favorite food or fasting, seems antiquated to most people who simply have no concept of what Lent is all about. And most people seem to have no idea why we are in need of penitence.

Which is why these forty days (not counting Sundays) prior to the Christian faith's most sacred day are more important now than ever. This is a time that we need to recommit ourselves to that which we say we believe and engage in thoughtful self-reflection. This is a time to think deeply about how we are living our lives today and where we want to end up at. It is a time to consider what our priorities are and what we truly believe in.

During this season of Lent, as we watch each day slowly lengthen by staying lighter longer and getting a little warmer, perhaps we can also take the time to reflect on what things we would truly want to remain the same and what things we would want to change into something better. Lent is a time when we remember the journey Jesus took to the cross to bring about really radical change in our lives by sacrificing his own life so that we may all have eternal life.

After that first Easter morning, nothing was the same again, and we thank God for the greatest gift of change we could ever receive. That is the hope and expectancy we anticipate. But before we get there, we can turn to God for help on the things we need to change, because we all have room for improvement. But the one thing that will never change is God's love for each and every one of us.

Join us this year as we begin living out the Gospel of Jesus Christ and helping to usher in the new Kingdom of God during the season of Lent.

Tamara went through 3 long days of testing on both Mathias' and herself, and found she was eligible for this surgery. Stewardship

Believe it or not, there is more to St. Paul’s Summer Hill than just what you see on Sunday morning! Some of those things include teaching Sunday School, Confirmation, and Bible Study Classes. We participate in mission projects like the Schuylkill Haven Food Pantry, Servants to All, and the Council of Churches. The church is used as a meeting location by organizations like the Boy Scouts as well as numerous church committees during the week. We organize and participate in church fellowship and community events. We visit those in hospitals and nursing homes, comfort those who experience loss, and provide spiritual care to those in need. We plan weddings and banquets, work with the Schuylkill Association and the Pennsylvania Southeast Conference, and plan ecumenical events with other area churches of all denominations. We also work to maintain the church building and property, which as you know, is not an easy thing to do!

All of these things are planned and prepared by leadership and staff who are deeply committed to our becoming who it is God is calling us to be. The ministry and mission of our church take place because of the spiritual *and financial* gifts our members and friends choose to offer. These are the resources that fuel our mission; and yes, it does cost real money to provide these spiritual things!

The decision to give a gift is a choice, but as a follower of Jesus, it really isn’t an option! Based on what we have received, we are encouraged to give

something – out of thanksgiving for what God has done, and as a sign of faithfulness and commitment to be a part of the good things that God is continuing to do in our world. We have the gift of Jesus and we are invited to respond to what God has given us with generosity of our own.

To make that gift may mean making a decision to give something away that you might use for something else. To do that may require choosing to not buy a fancy coffee, or deciding to carry a sack lunch into the office once a week instead of buying lunch. The amount may seem insignificant, but did you know that if just half of our family giving units increased their gift by just \$5 every week, we would be able to close the nearly \$27,000 gap between our budgeted expenses and current giving rate. Your gift matters – it matters to you as the giver, and to the church which utilizes it as a resource for mission.

As a congregation, we are entering a time of discerning what we will contribute monetarily in the coming year. The practice of exercising financial stewardship is a spiritual discipline and a way to grow our faith. There is joy to be found in practicing generosity and it begins with a simple step of a commitment to contribute regularly. The gifts we bring make good things happen. Thank you for being a part of it.

CROSS OF ASHES — On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, worshipers’ foreheads are often marked with ashes in the sign of the cross. The ashes traditionally come from burning palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday. In the Old Testament, ashes were a sign of mourning and repentance. Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus’ death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: “You are dust, and to dust you shall return.”

Spring Training For Christians

The word Lent comes from Middle English and German words for springtime. In light of the start of baseball season, some people call the pre-Easter season “spring training for Christians.” This fresh perspective moves away from the flawed understanding that Lent must be somber, or that giving something up for Lent is punishment for sin or a way to earn God’s favor.

As people of faith, we should never take a season off. But every so often — at least once a year! — we do well to examine where we need to get back in shape spiritually. Perhaps we will indeed opt to give something up: that swearing habit, sleeping in on Sundays, or the cost of a weekly treat so we can donate the money instead. Or maybe we’ll take on something new for Lent: a Bible study, prayer routine or service project.

Hebrews describes spiritual discipline as challenging in the moment but yielding righteousness later. The writer urges us, “Lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees ... so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed” (12:11-13, ESV). May the spring training of Lent strengthen and heal us all.

God-Shaped Hole

Have you ever neared the completion of a jigsaw puzzle, only to discover that a piece or two is missing? That’s an apt visual for what it’s like to live without God. Blaise Pascal, a 17th-century philosopher, observed: “There is a God-shaped vacuum in the heart of each man which cannot be satisfied by any created thing but only by God the Creator, made known through Jesus Christ.”

Centuries earlier, St. Augustine proclaimed “Thou hast made us for thyself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they find their rest in thee.” And in the Old Testament, the writer of Ecclesiastes expounded on the meaninglessness of earthly striving and material pursuits. Only God’s Spirit can fill our emptiness and satisfy our eternal longings.

“I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full,” says Jesus in John 10:10 (NIV). He alone provides the solution for emptiness. What comfort to be filled with — and to find our fulfillment in — our Savior!

A Prayer For Lent

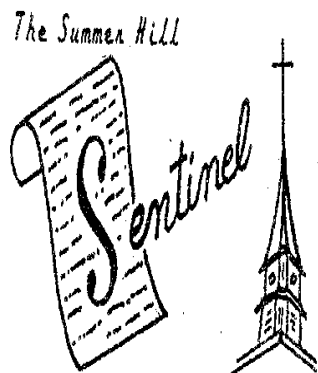
