Pastor's Page

Easter Greetings Summer Hill!

I realize it is almost the beginning of March and we will only be observing the third Sunday of Lent on the first Sunday in March, but Easter will be on the last Sunday in March this year, March 31st, before you get the next newsletter. As you recall, there are six Sundays during the Lenten season, which began on Ash Wednesday, which was on Valentine's Day this year on February 14th. So, Easter is definitely coming early this year, although the Lenten season is still 40 days long (not counting Sundays) as it has been every year since being formally instituted by the church after the First Council of Nicaea in 325 CE (or AD).

Unlike Christmas, which we always celebrate on the 25th of December, Easter falls on different days, which can vary widely from year to year. This is because Easter is based on the Lunar Calendar, and always falls on the first Sunday after the full Moon that occurs on or after the Spring equinox, with the stipulation that if that first full Moon falls on a Sunday, then Easter is on the following Sunday. That certainly makes it very difficult for the average person to predict when Easter will be each year. The reason we celebrate Easter this way is because Jesus' death and resurrection occurred during the Jewish Passover, which is celebrated on the first Full Moon of the vernal equinox.

We also need to remember that during Jesus' earthly life, the Gregorian Calendar which we follow today was not even in place yet. Our present day calendar only began in October of the year 1582, after Pope Gregory XIII replaced the Julian calendar with it due to a gradual shifting of the Church's feast days over the centuries because the Julian calendar erroneously calculated leap years. So, even the

calendar followed by nearly all countries around the world was because the Christian Church needed to be able to celebrate feast days correctly!

Although the solar Julian Calendar was instituted in 45 BC by the Roman Emperor Julius Caesar and was based on the earth's revolution around the sun, the Jewish faith uses the lunisolar Hebrew calendar where the beginning and ending of the 12 months of the solar year were based on the appearance of the new moon. And the start of their days began after the setting of the sun and continued until the next sunset. So, trying to compare the months and days described in the Bible with our calendar today can become quite confusing.

What does all this mean? Well, for one thing, it means that people have invented many different ways to measure time, and none of them are perfect. It also means that the importance we sometimes place on specific dates and times, is of our own doing, so that we can mark our earthly time and remember those things that are important to us.

However, Isaiah wrote, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord." (Is 55:8) And Peter wrote, "But do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day." (2 Peter 3:8) Our timeless God, is the "Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end." (Rev. 22:13) So whenever Easter occurs, remember that it is to remind us not of a specific date on the calendar, but of the promise of life eternal that has no time, through faith in Jesus Christ. And that, is all we need to remember.

Stewardship Letter

It cannot be said enough. St. Paul's Summer Hill UCC is very blessed to have such a faithful and generous community of faith supporting our ministries. While we hear about the increasing number of church closures due to declining membership, attendance, and giving, St. Paul's is thriving and committed to being a beacon of light shining Christ's love to all.

Our membership is steady, our worship attendance is rebounding, and our giving has increased year on year during some of the most difficult economic times we have seen in decades. We all should praise God for the gifts we have been given and entrusted with.

There is also the reality that costs have continued to outpace even the increased giving we have been blessed with. During our annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday February 25th, we learned that while the Consistory has taken many measures to cut expenses and be good stewards of our resources, we still ended 2023 with a deficit over \$12,000.

Obviously, we all are hoping that inflationary costs will improve in 2024 and beyond, but in order for the church to continue to provide the ministries and services to our members and community, we will need to either increase the gifts coming into the church or cut expenses further. At first, this may seem like a daunting task to undertake. Many are giving as much as they can already, and making sacrifices at home to make ends meet.

However, we are in a much better position than many churches who simply no longer have the membership to maintain their ministries. The chart of giving on the next page tells a different story at St. Paul's. It shows:

- The total number of giving units increased from 145 in 2022 to 152 in 2023.
- Overall offerings increased 8% from \$153,473 to \$166,091.
- The top 20% of our givers increased their offerings by 13%, from \$108,203 to \$122,241.

This tells us that the top 20% of our giving units, (33), contributed 74% of our total budget or about \$65 per week per giving unit. We praise God for their generosity and are so grateful for their dedication to St. Paul's. This also tells us that 80% of our giving units (119) contributed 26% of our budget, or \$43,850, for an average of about \$7 per week per giving unit.

While many of those in the 80% may already be giving as much as they can, our biggest potential to meet our budget in 2024 lies within this group. If even half of this group was able to give at least \$10 a week more than last year, we would easily recover from our current deficit and meet our 2024 budget.

So, the message is clear! We need your help! Every member of St. Paul's is important and needed to keep our ministries going. Every gift is important. Remembering to give your weekly offering to church, even on those Sundays when you cannot be here in person is important.

Looking back at the annual reports from 1964 through at least 1974, shows that back then every member's yearly giving was published in the report for everyone to see! Times have certainly changed, and we will not be publishing individual names and giving. Pastor Ken does not even know how much any individual gives and that will not change. However, if each of us who wants to be counted as a member of St. Paul's was to give as if our contribution was going to be published for all to see, we would certainly not have any problem meeting the budget.

Please prayerfully consider how you can help us meet our 2024 goals by increasing your giving by whatever amount God has enabled you to give. No one will know how much that is, except you and God. But we will all be thankful for every gift!

Take Time To “Examen”

I’m grateful to live in an area with distinct seasons. Each time of year has unique characteristics that give way to the next. “For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven,” says Ecclesiastes 3:1 (ESV).

Each change of season also lends itself to *examen*, a spiritual practice that involves reflection. Typically done daily, examen invites people to recall past events (highlights, struggles, even mundane activities) and consider when they especially sensed God’s presence or when he seemed distant.

Try a deeper examen four times a year as the seasons change. As a starting point, use your answers to these questions:

- Looking back at the past season, when did I see God at work? What was life-giving to me?
- In what areas did I need God to work? What was life-draining?
- As I enter this next season, how is God inviting me to engage more with his presence?

God’s Provision While We Wait

A November 2023 landslide trapped 41 construction workers in a tunnel they’d been excavating for a Himalayan highway project. For 17 days, they were stranded nearly 3 miles from freedom. When rescuers’ drilling equipment broke, miners drilled through the last 2 meters of rock and gravel by hand. Finally, all the workers were pulled to safety through a 3-foot-wide steel pipe. Because they had received food, water, medicines, oxygen and even light through a narrow pipe while underground, all were in good health.

We are trapped in sin and brokenness: our sin and that of others, fragmented relationships and systems, nearby and across the globe. Christianity teaches that God’s way of goodness will win in the end. But before full rescue comes, what keeps us alive and hopeful — even healthy?

As water was faithfully provided to the laborers through that narrow pipe, God quenches our thirst through baptism. Scripture and the sacrament of communion are the food and medicine that nourish and strengthen us. Prayer — our own and others’ prayers for us — along with the Holy Spirit’s gifts such as comfort and joy flow into our lives like the light of hope and the oxygen of life. Though complete rescue seems slow to come, God provides for us while we wait.

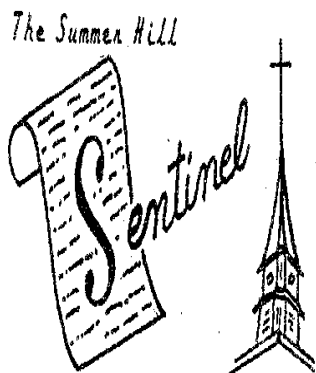
