Pastor's Page

Greetings Summer Hill!

This year, as we move through the anticipation of Advent, the joy of Christmas, and into the new calendar year, we find a consistent, profound theme woven through it all: New Beginnings. This is a powerful opportunity for renewal offered to us by God, providing both a spiritual closing and a faith-filled start. As the civil calendar year winds down, the church liturgical calendar begins its new year with Advent. This duality gives us a whole month to step away from the noise and merriment of secular holiday preparation and instead focus on our spiritual journeys. It is a purposeful time of waiting and preparing our hearts.

Many of us follow the tradition of lighting the Advent candles on a wreath. The wreath itself—an evergreen circle—symbolizes eternity and the life that is everlasting in Christ. The process of lighting the candles each Sunday is meant to be a deliberate act, moving from darkness toward the singular, brilliant light of the Christ candle. You will often find four candles—three purple and one pink—with a white "Christ candle" in the middle, representing themes like Hope, Peace, Joy (the pink candle), and Love. The overall purpose is to retell the nativity story and remind us of our redemption through God's grace.

At the very start of the church year, we are reminded that God offers each of us a new beginning through the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We are given a new lease on life, no matter what came before. The old year has passed, and we are given new life as disciples of Christ. Take time over Advent to prepare your heart and reflect on your spiritual journey, remembering that the Light of Christ came into this world long ago as a baby in a manger, ready to illuminate your path today.

While the holiday rush often culminates on December 25th, the season of Christmas extends all the way to Epiphany on January 6th. This period is not an ending but an opportunity to look deeper for continuous revelation and new beginnings.

Epiphany marks the day the Magi (or three kings) visited the baby Jesus and presented their gifts. Their quest was not a simple one; it was intense, demanding travel, and a steadfast commitment to seeking the newborn King. In the Christian context, Epiphany refers to the manifestation of Christ to the gentiles—the non-Jewish people of Jesus' time. This is a powerful truth because it says that Jesus came into this world for *all* of us, making the Light accessible to all who keep seeking Him. The Magi's journey assures us that it doesn't matter where we have been this past year or how far we have wandered; we are always given the chance to start a new beginning to walk with Jesus. We are called to look for the light, not just in the manger scene, but in the unexpected places of our everyday lives where Christ continues to reveal Himself.

The Magi, after encountering Jesus, chose to take a different route home. This physical act symbolizes a profound spiritual choice: once you encounter Christ, you can't simply go back to your old life and old ways. Just like them, each of us can choose a new beginning and strive to become the person God is calling us to be.

As we say goodbye to the old year and usher in the new, let us make resolutions that reflect the faith we have in Jesus as our Lord and Savior. We often default to "to do" lists—eat less, exercise more, clean the garage. This year, let's dedicate ourselves instead to resolutions of discipleship; commitments to who we want "to be" in Christ.

Here are a few ways we can commit to a New Beginning in the coming year:

Rededicate ourselves to becoming active members of the Body of Christ in our church community. True discipleship requires shared fellowship and support.

Commit to a ministry that will shine Christ's love worldwide, whether through service in the church or outreach in the community.

Remember each day that it is through the strength of Christ that we can accomplish anything, not through our own resources alone (Philippians 4:13). Our human willpower often fails, but our trust in God's power is limitless. This is a year to lean into that strength.

However you choose to begin the new year, we wish you a year of joy, knowing that God journeys with us through every step of life. Christ's gift of a new beginning is always there.

Christian Symbol



POINSETTIA — This shrub, native to Mexico, is at the heart of legend about a poor girl who wanted to bring Baby Jesus a gift one Christmas Eve. As she walked to church, she gathered a bouquet of weeds — which Jesus miraculously transformed into lovely red flowers. Thus the poinsettia (named for Joel Poinsett, the U.S. ambassador to Mexico who first brought the plant to America) is known in Mexico as la flor de la Nochebuena (flower of the Holy Night). The poinsettia is also an ideal Christmas symbol because its leaves turn red when deprived of sunlight and its flowers (the red inner buds) bloom in December.


