Pastor's Page

Lenten Greetings Summer Hill!

There is a unique stillness that accompanies the month of March. While the calendar tells us that Spring is officially arriving, and we begin to see those first brave crocuses peeking through the thawing soil, we find ourselves deep in the heart of the Lenten season. This year, having begun our journey on Ash Wednesday back in mid-February, we are now fully immersed in our forty-day trek toward Jerusalem. It is a season of transition, mirroring the earth's own slow awakening, as we move from the dormancy of winter toward the vibrant promise of renewal.

It is easy to get caught up in the "busy-ness" of our daily schedules, but Lent calls us to a different pace. It invites us to pause and ask the difficult, yet beautiful questions of our faith. This year, our Wednesday evening meditations are centered on a question that has stood at the very core of Christianity for two millennia: "*Why Did Jesus Have to Die?*" Using Adam Hamilton's insightful book as our guide, we are exploring the deep significance of the cross—not just as a historical event, but as a transformational reality for our lives today.

I want to personally encourage you to make our Wednesday Lenten Services a priority this month. In a world that often demands our constant attention and energy, these mid-week gatherings offer a vital "rest stop" for the soul. They provide us with a sacred space to quiet the noise of the world, gather our thoughts, and focus on the immense, sacrificial love that led Jesus to the hill of Calvary. It is through these shared moments of study and prayer that we strengthen our bond as a faith community and find the nourishment we need for the road ahead.

As the month draws to a close, we enter the most sacred week of our church year. Holy Week begins on March 29th with the celebratory waving of branches on Palm Sunday, a day of "emotional peaks" as we remember Christ's entry into Jerusalem. From there, the road leads us to some of our most moving and ancient traditions:

- **Maundy Thursday (April 2nd):** We will gather in Fellowship Hall for a special Seder Meal. By following this Jewish tradition as closely as possible, we connect with the ancient roots of our faith and remember the atmosphere of the Last Supper. It is a time for us to sit together as a family, sharing food and fellowship, just as the disciples did. Following the meal, we will transition into a Christian service with Holy Communion, reflecting deeply on the new commandment of love Jesus gave to his followers.
- **Good Friday (April 3rd):** We will observe a Tenebrae Order of Worship. This "service of shadows" is a powerful time of reflection. As we witness the gradual extinguishing of lights and the deepening darkness of the sanctuary, we are invited to sit with the weight of the sacrifice made on our behalf. It is a solemn, necessary step in our journey, symbolizing the depth of Christ's love in the face of absolute sacrifice.

I invite you to participate in as many of these services as possible, alongside our Sunday morning worship and Sunday School classes. There is a profound spiritual richness that comes from walking the full path—from the teaching in the temple to the upper room, and ultimately to the cross. We cannot fully appreciate the overwhelming joy of the empty tomb without first standing in the shadow of the cross and acknowledging the price paid for our grace.

May this month be for you a time of intentional reflection, spiritual renewal, and a deepening awareness of God's unchanging love.

STEWARDSHIP: Weathering the Storm Together

As we begin to see the first hints of spring peeking through the winter frost, we are reminded of the incredible resilience of our St. Paul's Summer Hill family. This past January and February brought some of the most challenging winter weather we have seen in years. While we had to cancel one in-person service, we were so grateful to still connect with many of you through our live-streamed worship. To those who have been looking out for neighbors, checking on the elderly, and providing a helping hand during these icy weeks—thank you for being the hands and feet of Christ in our community. Your safety is always our priority, and we encourage everyone to stay home and stay safe when road conditions are treacherous.

A Transparent Look at Our Current Needs

While the snow has been beautiful, it has created a significant "weather-related" challenge for our church finances. Because so many of our faithful givers were unable to attend in person, our giving for the period of January 1st through February 15th is **down 21.4%** compared to the same time last year.

At the same time, our costs to keep the church running—heating, electricity, and general maintenance—have **increased by 12.6%** during this same period. These consistent "routine" gifts are truly the heartbeat of our church; they keep the lights on and the heat running so our doors can remain open for worship, Sunday School, and our vital outreach programs like the local food pantries.

Bridging the Gap: How You Can Help

We are profoundly blessed by your generosity. In 2025, our congregation increased its total giving by **8.78%**. We know the heart for ministry is here! To help us close this early-year gap and ensure we don't start the year behind budget, we invite you to consider a few ways to support St. Paul's:

- **Make Up a Missed Offering:** If you were unable to attend due to the weather, please consider "catching up" on those missed weekly pledges. Every gift, no matter the size, helps us meet our obligations.
- **A "Step Up" for 2026:** If you are in a position to do so, consider a one-time gift or a slight increase in your weekly offering to help us offset these high winter utility costs.
- **Support via Live-Stream:** For those who regularly worship with us online, your financial partnership is just as vital to our mission as those sitting in the pews.
